PLEASE CONSIDER BEING A DONOR

In January one of our members received an organ transplant. The transplant will help save his life. You can help save a life too, here is how:

There are a variety of ways to be an organ, tissue and eye donor in New York State.

1. At the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV): Check off the donor box on your driver's license application or renewal form, or when applying for or renewing a non-driver identification card.
2. Online: Fill out the Donor Registry enrollment form on this website. Once you've filled out the form online, print it, sign it, and mail it to the New York State Department of Health.
3. By Mail: Download a Donor Registry enrollment form and mail it in.

No matter which method you choose to enroll, you will receive confirmation by mail from the New York State Department of Health that you are a designated donor. At that time, you can specify which organs and tissues you may wish to exclude. If you wish to order free copies of the New York State Donate Life Registry Brochure, send an e-mail to communications@nyodn.org or call 646-291-4456.

Joseph Sartorius Scholarship Application

2013 Theme: *In European countries such as France and Germany, which are only nominally Christian, there is a religion which is vibrantly expanding—Islam. This rapid growth of Islam has caused a good deal of xenophobia and religious discrimination in Europe. There is a great fear that Europe will loose its religious and cultural heritage. In the New York City area there has been a significant rise in the Muslim population. What is your opinion with regard to the increased Muslim presence in the United States. Will it damage or destroy our religious and cultural heritage? Will it enrich our country's future as was the case when Catholics first arrived in the United States in great numbers in the nineteenth century? Let us not forget how the first German and Irish Catholics were persecuted, even killed, when they first arrived in the United States.*

Scholarship Applicants must:

1. Be a member or the child (or grandchild) of a member of the Catholic Kolping Society of New York
2. Provide proof of enrollment in college or post-high vocational program.
3. Submit an essay of no less than 500 and no more than 1000 words. Please, follow the standards and format of the New York State English Regents essay. Remember that correct use of grammar, vocabulary, syntax and orthography will be taken into account.
4. Not be a previous winner.
5. Accept the decision of the judges as final.
6. Send application, proof of enrollment, and essay by **APRIL 15, 2013**. Please email materials electronically to richard.brunhuber@verizon.net. Wings of an Angel submitted by Martin A. Kelly



BF-109 pilot Franz Stigler & B-17 pilot Charlie Brown

The Reich's Minister of Armament, Albert Speer (1905-1981), remarked in a post-war interview that the "Second Front" had begun long before the invasion of occupied Europe. It was in the skies over Germany.

In this lofty arena, "viermots" (4-motored) bombers of the U.S. 8th Air Force tangled with Luftwaffe fighter planes in life-and-death struggles. Despite the desperate nature of the encounters, the antagonists never quite forgot the meaning of the word "honor."

On December 20, 1943, an American Boeing B 17, "Flying Fortress" with only one engine functional and the interior of the plane a shamble, limped toward its home base in England. The fuselage of the bomber loomed into the gun-sight of a BF 109 Messerschmit pursuit plane piloted by Lt. Franz Stigler. He had been an airline flyer who they drafted into the G.A.F. Stigler needed only a few more "confirmed kills" to qualify for the coveted "Pour le Merite" Blue Max award. Six of the bomber's 8 man crew were wounded, and the craft was riddled; it presented an easy victim for Stigler.

He resisted the temptation to bring the plane down. A devout Catholic who always carried his rosary in the pocket of his flight jacket, Stigler used hand signals to motion the B-17 pilot to set down at a German field or head for neutral Sweden.

Lt. Charles Brown of the American bomber did not understand the message. Running short on fuel, Stigler pointed in the direction of England, saluted, and flew off. For his courtesy, he could have been court-martialed; the air raids were relentless. Miraculously Brown's plane lumbered home. Stigler and Brown survived the war; Brown remained in the Air Force and Stigler returned to commercial flying. Neither forgot the show of valor in 1943.

In 1990 Brown put an ad in a WWII flyers newsletter. Stigler read it and immediately called up Brown to identify himself as the fighter pilot who had spared his crew's life. This began a lifelong friendship which ended in 2008, the year both died. In their obituaries, each was listed to the other as "Special brother—Enemies in War; Friends in Peace". Blessed Mother Exhortation for 2013 Homily given by Father RJB on January 1 Submitted by Bob Hemsing

Every New Year I compose a homily by using my imagination and asking the Blessed Mother to give us a focus/message for the coming year. This is the fruit of this endeavor for 2013. The homily was shared with the good people of St. Patrick's Church in Bay Ridge, Brooklyn. It was at their request that I printed a copy and make it available for your reflection:

Be at peace, my children. Be at peace! The worst is over! This year will finally begin the "spring time of the Church" that my son—John Paul—spoke about at the dawn of this millennium. What will revitalize our Church is your renewal in the Spirit: a Spirit of Hope, a Spirit of Trust and a Spirit of Peace.

This year will be marked with wonderful signs of reconciliation among old rivalries within the world, and it will be marked by a spirit of forgiveness in your homes and in your hearts. Finally, people will begin to understand the meaning of the words: "It is mercy I desire and not sacrifice" ...Mercy...Mercy and more Mercy!

Please be merciful with yourselves. Please start here! Forgive yourselves of whatever infractions, indiscretions, anger, jealousies—whatever commandments you may have broken—forgive yourself! Please! Enough! No more beating yourself up! Once confessed it is forgiven in Heaven. Let it be forgiven on earth—especially the earthly places of your hearts! So much lost energy and lost prayerfulness and lost hopefulness are wasted on residual guilt, falsely felt, over already confessed sins! This year turn the page on this forever!

Mercy on the world and the people with whom you share your day...Mercy...Mercy on them! Please stop judging others, it destroys your peace! It is a false comparison! You cannot know all that determines a person's behavior...why they do what they do. So judgement is

partial and provisional at best, and at worst, it robs you of your peace! The world judges, the world condemns. The world destroys.

My Son Jesus gives life! He gives new hope, gives another chance—always another chance! Why, then, if He gives life, hope and new beginnings—why follow the darkness of the world and destroy and diminish and dismiss? Your peace consists in the generosity of your judgment and the completeness of your forgiveness... Forgive yourself...Forgive others...AND forgive your human condition. Forgive the partiality of your knowledge. Forgive the way it is to be a human being!

My Son had to accept and forgive the human-ness of His incarnation—His embodiment made him vulnerable to the accidents, diseases and cruelty of others. His human-ness limited his divinity and his divine knowledge was submerged, dimmed, by the limitation of space, time and matter!

So much anger is focused and shed and concentrated on your human-ness. So much frustration at the pain associated with living—the aches that come with old age. These are blessings...really, you made it this far.

But there is even greater pain and anger at the mysteries of life: diseases, accidental death, malicious death—all that cuts down, shortens, a person's life.

Truth is that life is given by God and is taken back to Him by Him. You, nor I, will never know the human reason for this divine mystery—not until the other side—until the final manifestation of my Son on earth!

So stop regretting and second-guessing. And longing and pining for things to be different—for human nature to be immortal and all-powerful and all knowing. To do so is folly and hubris. To do so is to want to, to

desire to be God...and, alas, that is the core sin and root evil that my Son came to cure!

He revealed your true nature as adopted sons and daughters of the Spirit—sent by Jesus through our Father—but it is an adoption and a glory shared only fully at the end. Look forward to this final sharing and total fulfillment in Heaven's loving Embrace when your doubts and discouragement and despair will be transformed into knowing, hoping and loving God to His fullness, and you and your greatest image as His sons and daughters. Until then, do not question the human condition—it will destroy your peace and ruin your hope.

No! Have mercy on all situations and give God the benefit of all human doubt, for our Son proved through His life, death and resurrection all that awaits those who believe in Him! Have faith, my children...have faith, and in this year of faith—be at peace with all things, with all interior struggles. Let them melt into the peace of my Son who conquered all sins and doubts.

Be at peace with all relationships—giving all judgments to God who knows the human heart and the interior dispositions of the behavior of your friends, family and neighbors that comprise your relationships. Be at peace with them for only God knows their reasons!

Be at peace finally and forever with being human, with limitations and partial knowledge...with sicknesses that may occur and the accidents that can happen. It is all made whole and made right in God's greater plan that can make: good from evil, hope from despair and joy from sorrow. Peace, Peace and more Peace is this New Year to be filled, and it begins with Mercy, Mercy and more Mercy!
