JACK'S ESSAY:

How would you apply this to today's world and how could young people in 2025 follow in Father Kolping's footsteps? When I first learned about Adolph Kolping, I didn't expect to relate to someone who lived more than 200 years ago. He was a Catholic priest in 19th-century Germany, living in a time of factories, poverty, and huge change. But the more I read, the more I saw how relevant his mission still is, especially today. Kolping didn't just talk about helping people, he took real action. He created housing, education, and communities for struggling and underrepresented workers. His mission was to restore dignity and give people the tools to build a better life. That speaks directly to me—not only because I volunteer at a local food pantry, but also because I want to study business and use it to create real solutions that help people. Kolping's legacy reminds me that business and service don't have to be separate, they can work together to change lives.

I started volunteering at the local food pantry while in the Scouts. And during the pandemic in 2020, I noticed the car line waiting to get in the pantry kept growing and growing. When I volunteer, I help organize donations, pack food bags, and assist families who rely on the pantry to get by. At first, it felt simple, just helping and it made me feel better. But over time, I noticed the impact I created. I've seen people come in quietly, almost ashamed, and leave feeling a little more hopeful because someone treated them with respect or was just nice to them. I've seen parents breathe a sigh of relief when they realize there's enough for their kids to eat that week. And I've realized that behind every item that is handed out there is a human story, just like the people Kolping helped.

Kolping understood that people need more than just charity. They need an opportunity. He believed in helping people learn skills, find jobs, and become self-sufficient. That's where I see the connection to business. To me, business isn't just about making money, it's about solving problems, creating opportunities, and lifting people up. I want to study business not just to be successful, but to make a difference. Whether that means starting a social enterprise, building a nonprofit, or helping small businesses grow in under-resourced communities, I want to use what I learn to empower others.

We live in a world FULL of challenges—rising prices, housing insecurity, unemployment and sometimes, it just feels overwhelming. But Kolping's life reminds me that young people can start something meaningful. He didn't wait for someone else to fix things; he acted. He created the Kolping Society, a global network that still supports education, housing, and job training. We see that in our chapter of the Kolping Society and how much it does for others. Something I never really thought of while spending summers at KOH my whole life. I hope to one day create a business or organization that has that same lasting effect, something that doesn't just give help in the short term but gives people the tools to help themselves.

Even now, volunteering at the food pantry has opened my eyes to the way systems work and sometimes don't work. I've seen how many families fall through the cracks, even though they're working hard. I've started thinking about how businesses, nonprofits, and communities could work together to make sure resources get where they're needed most. It's pushed me to want to learn more. Business school will give me the knowledge, but my experience serving others is giving me the ambition.

Young people today are in a rare position. We have technology, access to so many ideas, and tools that Kolping never could have imagined. But we also face huge challenges. It's easy to feel like we can't make a difference and give up. But Kolping's example proves otherwise. We don't need to be perfect or powerful to start making changes. We just need to care and do something.

In conclusion, Adolph Kolping saw a broken world and chose to respond with courage, compassion, and creativity. As someone who volunteers at a food pantry and dreams of using business to help others, I see his legacy as inspiring. He reminds me that it's possible to combine service with strategy, and kindness with innovation. If he could create lasting change with so little, imagine what we can do today with education, determination, and heart.

Remembering our good friends Ernst Endrich and Bob Hemsing



Any Kolping member who has been around for a few years has a favorite "Ernst story" to share. We were blessed to memorialize the KOH pool in honor of Ernst Endrich on Father's Day.

Ernst Endrich joined the Society over 50 years ago—back in 1971. From day one, he was one of those people who could be counted on to pitch in when work needed to be done. He always had great stories and strong opinions which combined with his winning smile and outrageous sense of humor.

We think that Ernst (ably assisted by his lovely wife Wilma) is the only member who has served as House Manager for all three of our houses—88th Street, Concourse and KOH. Ernst served many years on the

Board of Directors guiding our Society to move forward and embrace the new while simultaneously treasuring our important traditions. When we lost our longtime K88 manager, Mary Minarik, Ernst jumped into the role bringing his experience managing buildings He used this time to hire new staff and groom them for leadership roles. He computerized operations (which may sound mundane now, but was a big deal in the '90s).

Ernst loved to have fun and so many of us have memories of good times together. Ernst loved the pool at KOH and served as Pool Manager—a thankless job—for many years. He participated in the Ski Trips into his 80s. Having learned to ski at age 3, that felt as natural to him as walking.
