THE CHINATOWN TRUNK MYSTERY

Take the inter-racial romance of a German-American debutante set in the murky environs of 1909, New York City's Chinatown: add, the belated discovery of a moldering, female cadaver in the suitor's apartment, coupled with the disappearance of the two subjects; and, you have the ingredients of the most gruesome homicide of that decade.

Elsie Sigel, 19, granddaughter of Civil War hero, Union General Franz Sigel, considered herself a "liberated" woman. She was "SELB-STISCH and BOCKIG." One of her "kicks" was conducting a Sunday school class at True Light

Lutheran Church on Pell Street. One of her students was, 30 year old, Leon Ling, debonair local merchant. Soon they became fascinated with one another and dated. However, the intensity of Elsie's libido didn't match Ling's who was a bit of a Romeo.

Suddenly they both disappeared without apparent rhyme or reason. Reports of suspicious odor ten days later coming from Ling's apartment prompted a police break-in. They found, crammed in a trunk, the badly decomposed body of a young female.

Forensic Science was in it's infancy. Without fingerprints, DNA, etc., positive identification was impossible. However, comparison of the corpses teeth with Elsie's and the presence of personal jewelry suggested that the dead woman was most likely Elsie Sigel.

Leon Ling was the "person of interest; " but, an international manhunt, with the cooperation of the Chinese Consul General, could not apprehend him. Most police investigators believe from all the evidence, including personal correspondence of Elsie's, that Elsie was intent on captivating Ling who became enraged at her ploys. In a fit of anger, he slewed her and fled. Years later, independent source

Others of a more romantic persuasion felt the body of the female was some unfortunate who was murdered and left as a decoy so that the "love birds" could fly over the horizon to live out their lives in a more tolerant society.

WHO WAS SAINT MAXIMILLIAN KOLBE?

Several years ago, the late Pope John Paul II added another name to the Roman Catholic liturgical calendar. The name of this new saint was Saint Maximilian Kolbe. In the canonization ceremony at St. Peter's, our Holy Father called him a modern martyr. Why was August 14th

designated as his Feast Day, you may ask?

Before becoming a Catholic priest, he was known as Raymond Kolbe. His devout Polish parents saw things about him and faced the fact that he was a difficult child....perhaps you might say a wild child. He was difficult to handle and given to mischief. Yet in spite of all of his conduct he masked a strong religious faith.

At the age of twelve, he received his First Holy Communion. It was at this time that he experienced a miraculous vision of the Blessed Virgin Mary. He was praying for Mary's maternal help, realizing his youthful disposition towards "trouble." The question was in his daily prayers, "What will become of me"?

As with most of us, little did he realize, that he was to experience a vision of Mary.

As related by Raymond, never expecting such a vision, he was asked by Mary, as she held out two crowns....inviting him to select one. The white crown symbolized purity. The red crown symbolized martyrdom. His reply to Mary was that he would accept them both.

In 1907, a year later, he applied for admission to the seminary where he excelled. In this preparation, he took the religious name of Maximilian. After ordination, he would become a publisher, journalist and missionary. In 1930 he was sent to Japan where he established a community in Nagasaki (which survived the atomic bombing of 1945.)

Health brought him back to Poland in 1936 where, like Father Kolping, he founded a newspaper and opposed conditions at the time. In 1939 he was arrested several times after the Nazi invasion of Poland. After having been caught sheltering 3,000 Jewish Polish refugees, he was sent to the death concentration camp of Auschwitz where he was subjected to the systematic torture reserved for priests and ministers.

One night at Auschwitz, there was a prisoner escape. The next morning the Nazi commandant lined up all of the prisoners...picked out each 10th man to be placed in a death bunker to stave to death, as punishment for the escape. Father Maximilian Kolbe listened to the cries of a Polish prisoner with a wife and family. "I don't want to die, I want to return home to my family after we have peace." Father Maximilian stepped out of the line and said to the guard, "Take me."

Death camp survivors at Auschwitz reported that instead of the cries of despair and outrage that came from other similar death bunkers, they heard hymns and prayers instead from the starved occupants, until that final day, when no more sounds were heard.

With the silence, the guards came to inspect and to kill anyone still alive. On entering, they found only the frail Father Maximilian Kolbe still alive. They bent on down, and gave him a lethal injection and then a report to the commandant, "All dead."

Throughout his life he lived the "first crown" of purity, that he accepted from Mary. On his death in the bunker, he accepted the second, "martyrdom." He was killed on August 14, 1941 the last one to die in the bunker... after having said "Take me."
