Stories of Interest

SYBIL BAUER submitted by Martin A. Kelly



In these stifling summer days, what can be more refreshing than a swim particularly, if the pool is at Kolping-on-the-Hudson (ein kleines Stück im Himmel).

While watching the Olympic swimming try-outs on TV, we would be remiss if we did not honor a brave female champion Sybil Bauer (1904-1926). Born in Chicago, Sybil literally, took to the water with the grace of a seal. By the time, she was seventeen she bested the Amateur Athlete Union's back stroke record. In the 1924 Olympics in Paris, she won the 100 meter back stroke gold medal. Her time was 4 full seconds faster than her closest competitor. She consistently won met after met, and in 6 years, had achieved 23 world records. At the peak of her career, tragedy afflicted this personification of vitality with cancer. She entered a hospital, but never came out. During a publicity tour in Florida she became ill, and hospital tests unexpectedly proved the worst.

Her long-term romance with Ed Sullivan, a sports writer who would become the celebrated TV entertainment impresario, played out its final act. In a touching death bed scene, Sullivan recited his wedding vows to the relic that had been an Olympic Swimming champion: And, he slipped a wedding band on her ring finger. Her funeral was a stately ceremony with a representation of the elite of the sports world attending. John Weismuller served as a pall bearer.

Sullivan, evidently, hid his love for Sybil, he never mentioned her in any of his biographical articles. Yet 40 years later, in 1967, when Sybil was inducted into the International Swimming Hall of Fame, Ed expressed his long-held feeling, if only briefly. In his voiceover that was to accompany Sybil's photo in the museum, Sullivan praised her charm, beauty and spirit. "Most sport casters had a crush on her, I know I did," he said.
