

BROTHER BERTHOLD SCHWARTZ AND HIS CANNON

The arms race is coming to an end. The Military Channel (173) describes artillery pieces that make war futile.

Technology has enabled army personnel to fire huge missiles from motorized carriers, with pin-point accuracy; and, they can scurry away before their location can be determined.

Curiously, the cannon was invented by a German monk, Brother Berthold Schwartz, of Freiburg around 1200. For years Chinese and European scientists

knew that certain chemicals when mixed together and brought in contact with flame would flare up, violently. Schwartz, as an

alchemist, mixed certain chemicals, experimentally, to find a formula for gold. As often happens while seeking one thing, you find another that is also, useful. Schwartz discovered basic gun powder, which, today, bears his name black powder. He also, harnessed the force created by the explosion of this powder to throw shells and other missiles.

The first cannon was a metal tube closed at one end. Powder was packed into the closed end and a projectile slammed against the powder. Then, through a hole bored at that end, flame is brought in that ignites the powder which explodes. The force from the blast forces the missile through the barrel and in the direction of the target.

Over the years, improvements have been made so that the ultimate artillery gun has been perfected. Will it effect history positively or otherwise? Time will tell.

YEAR FOR THE PRIEST

The "Year for Priests" will be an opportunity to observe and recognize the dedicated service of so many good priests. The "Year for Priests" (with our prayers) will be a reminder of the necessity for the whole church to pray for our priest and to encourage an increase in vocations to the priesthood.

Pope Benedict XVI recently declared a "Year for Priests" in an effort to foster within priests a yearning for "Spiritual perfection," The Catholic Church of today is in a desperate need of priestsyoung men to give thought, prayer, and a consideration of a vocation to the office of priesthood in the church. A recent article in the press quoted one diocese, where they reported that they had lost 30 priests in the past year, due to illness, retirement and death. They were replaced during the year with three ordinations.

This year we celebrate the 150th anniversary of the death of St. John Vianney, the 19th century saint who represents a "true example of a priest in the service of the flock of Christ" said the Holy Father.

Also known as "The Cure of Ars", St. John Vianney was noted for his holiness, his 10-15 hours a day hearing confessions and his life of personal penance to his Christ. After ordination he was assigned to Ars, a small town in France. In the course of his lifetime. many thousands would come from near and far to seek him out, to confess their sins, to ask for God's forgiveness and to amend their lives.

We are asked in the next year to pray for our priests, and their yearning for "Spiritual perfection". And to pray for an increase in vocation to the priesthoodthat those who feel that they may have the vocation will consult the proper channels for guidance.

THE FEAST OF THE ASSUMPTION



One of the feast days of the Church Year occurs this month on Saturday, August 15th, "The Feast Day of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary into Heaven." On November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII declared the Assumption of Mary, as a dogma, a belief held by members of the Church of Rome.

The church does not take a stand on whether Mary died before she was assumed body and soul into heaven. In the Eastern Catholic Church there is a tradition that refers to the occasion as the dormition or "Falling asleep" of Mary.

For many years it was one of the strict six Holy Days of Obligation in the church year. A few years ago, the bishops of the

United States declared that "There is no obligation henceforth," when one of the six major feasts falls on a Saturday or a Monday, thus avoiding compulsory Mass attendance two days in a row (with Christmas and the Immaculate Conception being the exceptions).

Therefore Saturday, August 15th is not a Holy Day of Obligation, this year of 2009.

NEWS FROM THE BRANCHES

PHILADELPHIA

From Father Bert Michel, Philadelphia Praeses: Over the coming months, I will be giving you a short-ened account of the by-laws of the Philadelphia Kolping Family. The first fact that I bring to your attention is the name of the society both nationally and locally as found in the by-laws of each organization. The official name of the national society is "Catholic Kolping Society of America". The by-laws for our branch state: the name of the corporation shall be "Kolping Society of America, Philadelphia Branch".

ARTICLE 2 of the by-laws gives a statement of our objectives. It states: The objectives of the Society shall be: a) to function as a Catholic social organization, with special emphasis upon the stimulation and cultivation of a vigorous religious and civic consciousness and life. b) to imbue its members by spiritual, intellectual, and practical means, with a concept of artisanship as a vocation, in opposition to the specialistic view of the worker as a wage earner pure and simple, in conformity with the Church's conception of the inter-relation of work and religion. c) to develop their personality in the service of the people as a whole, and to open for them a better access to culture. d) to inculcate in its members and all, lawfully constituted authority, religious and civic, a great consciousness of general moral responsibilities, e) to give instructional courses on social and civic subjects in conformity with the Catholic philosophy of life.
