The Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary Kolping on Concourse

August 15th, the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, is celebrated around the world. The Kolping House on the Grand Concourse in the Bronx always makes a very special occasion of this beautiful solemnity. The festivities began this year with an inspirational Mass celebrated by Father Greg Lyttle. Father Lyttle told us that in addition to the day we recognize as the occasion when the Blessed Virgin was taken body and soul into heaven, today was also his mother's 96th birthday and that her name was Mary Assumpta. He further explained that although this particular feast had been celebrated since the 2nd Century, it was only officially established in 1950 by Pope Pius XII as a Holy Day of Obligation.

The Feast of the Assumption has become many things for Catholics, an inspiration for vocations, an occasion for joyful processions and an opportunity for all of us to ask our Blessed Mother for her intercession against the evils present in the world today.

WASHINGTON CROSSING THE DELAWARE

A shoulder to lean on.
A hand to hold.
A smile to encourage you when you feel low.

A finger to wipe away the tears you cry.
Arms to catch you when you fall.
Legs to run to you when you call.

Whatever you need – I am.

A helmet of faith to surround you when doubts arise.
A chest plate of righteousness to keep honor in your life.
A shield of truth to protect you from the lies of the world.
A sword of strength to fight the battles you're too tired to fight.
Shoes to carry you into the goodness of peace.

Whatever you need – I am.

A breeze to send you a message of love.
A shadow to be the person by your side.

A star to be the twinkle in your eyes.
A sun to be the light in the day.
A moon to be your guide at night.

Whatever you need – I am.

While patriotic symbols as the American Flag and the Liberty Bell, featured on first class U.S. postage, conjure up ideas and sentiments of love of country, they lack the emotion that the mural "Washington Crossing the Delaware" conveys.

In this tableau – like painting, the artist Emanuel Leutze, a German-American, captures the daring of these lovers of liberty trolling their way past shoals of ice, in an open boat, with General George Washington standing near the bow. Their mission is to raid the encampment of their oppressors in Trenton, New Jersey and Washington urges them onward.

Emanuel Leutze was born in Gmund, Wurtemberg, Germany. At the age of nine, he was brought to Philadelphia where his family settled. Leutze's talent at painting expressed itself in several works of art that won the critical approval of the local connoisseurs. They helped finance his education in Europe under the masters, in 1846.

Leutze had a fondness for epic moments in world history and a fertile imagination that could translate these events into breath-taking figures. For example, he painted "The Festive Reception of Columbus on his First Return from America (1847)".

Also "Lady Godiva," and "Mary Stuart hearing First Mass on Return to Scotland (1854)."

In 1850, while watching ice flows crashing in the Rheine, he received his inspiration to render the ordeal that Washington and followers endured crossing the Delaware River. This work won for him the gold medal in Berlin.

"Washington Crossing the Delaware" insured his fame as a great artist, and when he returned to America in 1859, he received an ovation, commissions followed both private and governmental sectors. Although he created about 80 works of art, none exceed "Washington Crossing the Delaware." It was
