The impression someone makes is largely determined by his or her appearance. Cosmetic surgery has enhanced the lives of countless people by improving their looks.

there is not much medical science can do to restore sight to the blind; but, a person with vision in one eye can present a fairly normal appearance thanks to the efforts of a German-American family in New York City.

Andrew Gougelman brought the art of making prosthetic eyeballs (called oculars) here in 1851. Actually, the imitation "eyeball" is a cap which fits over the natural or prosthetic orbit in the patient's eye socket. With the aid of this device, the user's visage resembles a normal person's eye and he is able to interact with others more effectively.

The family-run firm is located in midtown and continues to serve the public for over 150 years.
