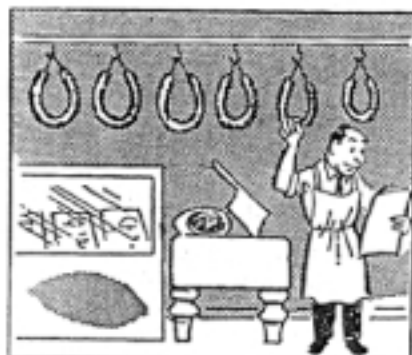

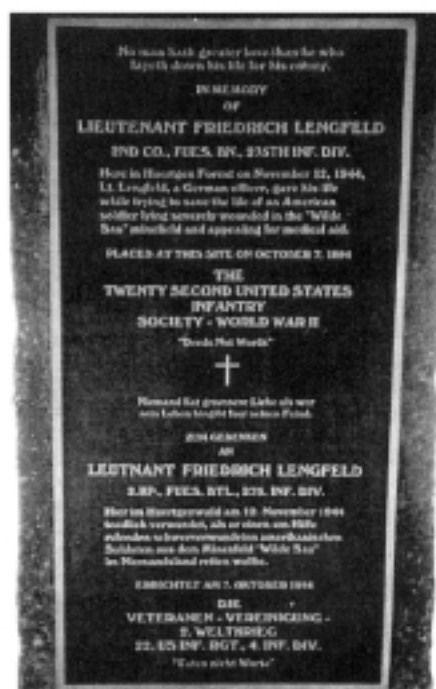

Stories of Interest

Lieutenant Friedrich Lengfeld

In the Fall of 1994, a delegation of American World War II veterans journeyed to a German military cemetery. Their purpose was to dedicate a memorial to a German officer buried there. Strange?

Let's say it sometimes takes years for certain events to come to the surface. Anyway, in the Fall of 1944, German and American forces were locked in battle in the Hurtgen Forest, near Aachen on the German-Belgium border. The ferocity of the fight has been ignored, partly because the all-out Battle of the Bulge followed it and overshadowed it. Actually, the forest was the scene of the longest single battle the American army ever fought (September-December 1944), and American casualties amounted to 24,000 deaths and thousands of wounded or incapacitated.

On the morning of November 12, 1944,

a fire fight broke out between American and German forces. In the exchange of fire, a wounded American soldier was stranded in no-man's-land between opposing forces, and he cried out for help.

No one on either side moved for fear of drawing the enemy's attention. Then, a German officer, Lieutenant Friedrich Lengfeld, gave up the relative safety of his fox hole to try and retrieve the wounded enemy and get him to an aid station.

Hand-over-hand, the Lieutenant crawled across the cold, bullet-pocked earth. As he bellied toward the dying enemy, what thought could have gone through his mind? Unnoticed by him was the spot where an armed teller mine had been buried. They were called "teller" because they resembled a serving tray, but contained enough high explosives to kill and maim a half-dozen soldiers.

As the Lieutenant inched forward, his upper body crossed the location of the mine. When he shifted his weight toward his fallen enemy, the pressure detonated the mine in a terrifying blast.

A small token of respect and gratitude to the Lieutenant, a group of American survivors of the battle dedicated a tablet describing his selflessness. The forward reads: "no man hath greater love than he who layeth down his life for his enemy."

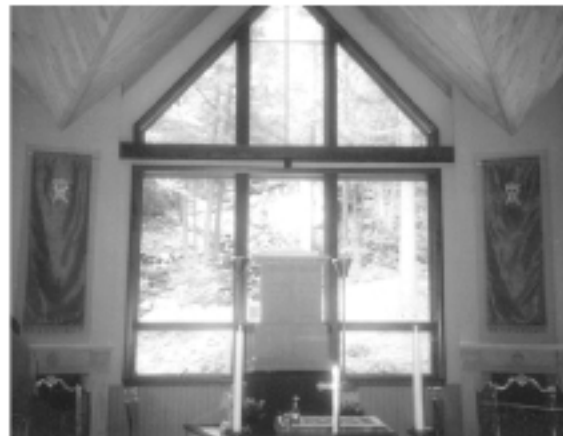
