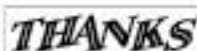

Stories of Interest

WILLIAM EDWARD BOEING (1881-1956) submitted by Martin A. Kelly

The name "Boeing" has been in the news, lately. Older readers will recall the World War II Boeing aircraft, the "Flying Fortress" which was the mainstay of the 8th Air Force. You might be interested to know that this aircraft pioneer was German-American.

His German father and Austrian mother immigrated to America when William was a youth and they settled in Detroit. His father died when he was eight and he would face the world pretty much by himself.

His family was of some wealth and he was on the alert for promising investments. He did well in lumbering and mining.

He took up mechanical engineering and learned how to fly. With the advent of World War I he put these skills together and filled some U.S. Army contracts for air planes. Convinced of the future of aircraft: commercial, pleasure, and military, he became an aircraft manufacturer.

He made both sea planes and land-base planes. Some of his sea planes navigated from Seattle, Washington to Vancouver, Brit Columbia; and, some of his land-based planes carried the U.S. Mail.



As the 1930's wore on, the economy slackened and work orders decreased. Boeing supplemented his own company's payroll from his investments; but, the auxiliary firms he depended on for parts, etc. began to go under. He jumped in and bought them out or worked out other deals to keep them solvent. For his good business sense and help to the faltering industry, he was awarded the prestigious Daniel Guggenheim Medal "for successful pioneering and achievement in aircraft manufacturing and air transport."

But, alas a storm appeared on the horizon. Congress investigated his holdings which included what became known as Boeing Aircraft, United Aircraft and United Airlines, and decided it was in restraint of trade and monopolistic.

Feeling angry and betrayed, he resigned his company position and sold almost all his aviation stock. He went into early retirement (1935), but came out in World War II for managerial advise. He spent his time fishing, cattle and horse breeding. In 1942, he donated his estate in Seattle to the Children's Orthopedic Hospital. He died in 1956; although, his name remains, he severed his ties with Boeing Aircraft in 1935.
