We Missed You!

Once again most of you missed a wonderful weekend. All of us that went to the 38th National Convention in Cincinnati, Ohio were treated to a wonderful time and had an opportunity to get to know some of the other families under the Kolping umbrella.

For us, my husband Bob and I, it started with the host city sending someone to meet our plane and take us to the hotel. (Just for your trivia collection—the Cincinnati Airport is located in Kentucky). Because of an annual event in downtown Cincinnati they were not able to obtain reasonable rates for a downtown hotel so they had booked a hotel about 30 miles outside the city. This did not stop us from having a grand time—in fact we saw some of the area around a big city.

We met up with some of the Chicago family who we joined for dinner that Thursday night and with whom we spent a very nice time at a place called "EnterTRAINment" on Friday morning. The next morning while the delegates buckled down to work the rest went on a bus tour that took them on a tour of the city and lunch at the Hofbrauhaus and a tour of Museum Center & Omnimax Theater. All came back raving about the outstanding arrangements were made by our host family.

Saturday evening we were at the Kolping Center for dinner (delicious pork cutlets with all the trimmings and/or "Skyline Chili"

(which I can attest was VERY good). They also had target shooting and a game called "Corn Hole" and we were entertained by their Saengerchor and the Enzian Dancers. I can speak from the group on the bus that all had a wonderful time.

Mass on Sunday morning was held at Old St. Mary's Church downtown. Msgr. Axel Werner, International Praeses, concelebrated the Mass with the most Rev. Dennis M. Schnurr, Archbishop of Cincinnati and priests from our various families. Father mentioned that he was happy to celebrate Mass with us and mentioned the work Fr. Kolping and the German influence that was present in Cincinnati. In fact that bricks that were used to build Old St. Mary's were baked in the ovens of the families each night and brought back in the morning so building could continue.

Afterwards we had brunch on the 16th floor of a hotel which gave us a view of the Ohio River and area. That evening we had cocktails and the Awards Banquet (to make your mouths water the meal consisted of Rouladen and trimmings and for dessert "Bienenstick"). Our own Bonnie Dengler and Erich Roessler were the recipients of some of the Distinguished Service Awards given. And may I add very well deserved.

The next morning we attended the Closing Mass and said a final farewell to "old" friends and new and promised to meet them in two years in the city by the bay, San Francisco.

While the others were off on the tour on Saturday the delegates were hard at work. Besides the "boring" but very necessary financial and very disappointing recruiting reports, we were privileged to hear Monsignor Axel Werner, our International Praeses, report on the progress of International Families. Do you know that Kolping has families in over 60 countries,

among them many in Africa and India? Also that the government in some of the countries has copied the approaches Kolping has made in some areas. He also explained why some methods work in one area and not in others. One home that has had a positive response is a home that allows seniors to interact with a home for single mothers that are having a hard time. Both parties are receiving benefits of the mixing of ages.

From our New York family, Gerhard Schmidt (with the help of a Cincinnati brother) showed the delegation of the advances made here in New York on the renovations that are allowing a work place, meeting room, record storage, etc. room for National.

John Reitter, not only a very active member of our New York family but our representative at the UN, gave us a short (Ha, Ha) and very insightful talk on his travels the last two years and how some of the families around the world are doing.

Last but not least the election of new officers was held and our own Bernie Preisser was elected as President for the next two years.

As an aside—it pays to keep your Kolping Membership card with you. I thought I received the benefit when I purchased a necklace and because I mentioned Kolping the women gave me a \$3.00 discount because her father had been a member for many years. But I was put to shame by one of the delegates—he told us that when he was coming out of church on the outskirts of Hamburg, Germany he and his brother spotted a sign that said "Kolping Breakfast". They decided to go in and when they showed them his ID from Kolping they not only treated them to breakfast but took them on a tour of Hamburg from one of the member's boats and also treated them to lunch and dinner. So talk about Kolping—you never know what will happen.

So start saving and plan to come to the 39th National Convention which will be held Labor Day Weekend of 2012, in the City by the Bay, San Francisco.

Stories of Interest

Sunflowers (The Secret History) submitted by Martin A. Kelly



Flowers, you might think, never played a significant role in history. "Not so," says Joe Pappalardo, author of "Sunflowers (The Secret History)," in which he describes how sunflowers were one of Hitler's motives in invading Russia, in 1941.

After the 1918 armistice ending World War I, the German people were subjected to humiliation and starvation. The British naval blockade, cutting off the delivery of vital food stuff, was not lifted. As a result many starved, and the shortage of vital

nutrients impaired the development of German youth.

This callous policy by the victors molded an attitude in the national psyche that "Germans had to look out for themselves" and helped pave the way for the acceptance of a dictator.

To restore the economy; and, at the same time, provide for physical improvements and re-armament, the policy makers shied away from importing food commodities. Cooking oils and butter were particularly in

short supply in Germany. The leaders turned to substitute "ersatz" foods.

This helps to explain the idioms in the German language to "How are things going?" "Alles in Butter" for good times; oder, "Alles in Schmalz" for poor times.

The answer for this economic problem laid in sunflowers whose oil could be processed into margarine of high quality, as well as provide cooking oil.

Years earlier Peter the Great of Russia, in order to modernize his country, imported this North American plant, and Catherine the Great, a German herself, welcomed Mennonites from Germany to cultivate her adopted land using the sunflower for fodder and for the peasants diets. Clear evidence of the value of sunflowers to Germany's wartime economy was the priority shipment of confiscated seeds and their processing plants to the Reich as booty.

As the war wore on, the German troops came to live "off the land" themselves, and seeds for the home front dwindled. The sunflower panacea became another broken promise.

Today, sunflowers enjoy a new surge of importance in global food economy. Hybrid sunflower seeds have uses in: diesel fuel (biodiesel), in organic farming, and as a substitute for trans fat. Pappalardo, J. "Sunflower (Secret History)" pp. 9,1412-7.
