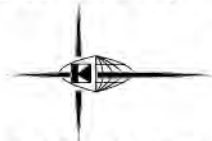

Stories of Interest

“Der Vaterland” submitted by Martin A. Kelly



Olympic games have always drawn international interest. Much money, sweat, and work goes into training a winner. Somehow, a medalist reflects positively on the winner's homeland.

At the turn of the 20th Century, another kind of international competition was the rage: construction of gigantic ocean liners for passenger travel. France, England, and other European countries had their entrants—Queen Mary, Normandie, etc. Germany followed suite and built three “empresses of the ocean” as they were referred to. The most interesting of these “Dampfer Schiff” (steamships) was “Der Vaterland”.

She was launched at Hamburg in 1912 after the design of A. Ballin. He incorporated lessons learned from other countries' vessels. For one thing, “der Vaterland” had high pressure turbines with quadruple screw propellers. The furnishings of the interior were designed to lull the passengers into feeling they were in a city hotel. There was a ballroom, swimming pool, restaurant called the “Carlton”, casino, concert-size orchestra, etc. These accommodations were for the first class passengers; third class, or steerage, as they were called, were austere.

“Der Vaterland” made three and a half transatlantic crossings. When World War I was declared in August 1914, she was at anchor in Hoboken, NJ. She would remain there, gathering barnacles, for three years. The Royal Navy ruled the seas and had blockaded her home port.

In April 1917, America became a participant in the war on the side of France and England. The U.S. Navy seized “Der Vaterland” as a prize of war and converted her to a troop transport renamed the “Leviathan” (which the doughboy passengers nicknamed “the Levi Nathan”).

The Leviathan made four crossings in her new role. But the number “four” must have had a jinx for her. On her fourth peacetime trip, the war broke out; on her fourth wartime passage, influenza among the soldiers broke out. The sick list grew each day of the voyage, and the Leviathan had become a hazard ship with 91 deaths and thousands of illnesses.

In the two decades following the Armistice, the Leviathan, in the British Merchant Navy, served as a passenger-cargo ship. In January 1938, she cast anchor for the last time in Liverpool, where she was dismantled and converted to scrap metal. Much of the decoration that was stripped on her seizure and conversion in 1917, including a portrait of Kaiser Wilhelm, ended up in bazaars and curio shops.

Kolping Saengerchor Competes in 2012 Choir Games submitted by Jack McGee

The Kolping Saengerchor has now successfully competed on the world choir stage. They have performed in the Open Competition Folklore Division of the World Choir Games. The unity experienced by all during the games speaks to the power of music to bring us together as one. The World Choir Games has brought choral the music world to Cincinnati, Ohio for its bi-annual competition in 2012. Three hundred fifty choruses and well over 15,000 singers from 63 countries sang in a number of venues including: The Aronoff Center for the Arts, School for Creative and Performing Arts, Cincinnati Masonic Center, Christ Church Cathedral and many other area stages. The Duke Energy Convention Center served as the hub of event coordination and served meals in its cafeteria that holds 7000. Choral workshops and meetings are held there and a massive lounge provides a gathering place for singers. The excitement generated by this event has been both contagious and inspiring. Cincinnati is the epicenter of activity for the 2012 World Choir Games presented by INTERKULTURE based in Munich, Germany. The presenting Sponsor for the 2012 World Choir Games is Proctor & Gamble headquartered in Cincinnati. This is the first time that the games have been held in the United States.

The Opening Ceremony was held in the 5th/3rd Bank Arena on the 4th of July with over 10,000 guests and singers in attendance. A massive parade of nations started the festivities with choirs in the native costumes. The Cincinnati Pops Orchestra and May Festival Chorus performed an inspiring show. The World Choir Games Peace Bell, which was made in Cincinnati by the Verdin Company, was rung and the games were declared open. The Kolping Saengerchor began preparation for the games a year and a half ago. 55 singers made the commitment to compete. After many rehearsals and much hard work our chorus was ready to perform.

Our chorus sang on Thursday, July 5th at 12:45 PM in the Proctor & Gamble Hall of the Aronoff Center in the Open Completion Category 21 Folklore. The songs that we selected to perform were “Brueder, reich die Hand zum Bunde” by Mozart, “Der Lindenbaum” by Schubert, “Als Freunde” by Onnen and “Wunderschoener Norden” by Frey-Voellen. The performance was judged by a panel of five international choral music professionals. The performance was met with a lively applause at the conclusion; and we very happy with the results. Five other groups from around the world also performed that morning. From around the world also performed that morning. Outside the stage door we gathered for a photo session with the Little Lark Choir from China.

The first week of competition came to an end with the Awards Ceremony held on Saturday evening, July 7th. The Participation Certificates, Open Competition Diplomas, Champions Competition Medals and Overall Champions Trophies were presented to each chorus participating. Excitement was fever pitched as the presentations were made. Trophy winners would rush to the stage for pictures and the raising of the winning choruses national flag while their anthem was played. The Kolping Saengerchor was honored by being awarded a Bronze Diploma in Folklore Level IX. This prize will be displayed in a very special place on the wall of our clubhouse. We are very proud of this distinct honor and our participation in the 2012 World Choir Games.

Our participation in the World Choir Games ended with a community Friendship Concert. This concert was given by our Kolping Saengerchor, the Saengerkreis Hildburghausen from Germany and the Crescendo Arte Children's Choir from Colombia at Mainstrasse Village in Covington, Kentucky. There were 350 people in attendance and the audience was thrilled with the international concert and feelings of worldwide togetherness.

The World Choir Games was a fantastic experience for our Chorus and gave us a wonderful opportunity to proudly represent our tradition of German singing, the NASB, the Southern Ohio, Kentucky, Indiana and Illinois District, the City of Cincinnati and the United States of America.

NOVEMBER ON THE CHURCH CALENDAR

November is dedicated to the Suffering Souls in Purgatory. Catholics believe in a reward after death, and that place is Heaven.
