THEME: "Let's show Christian living in ever more practical ways and the present will be better and the future brighter." —Father Adolph Kolping

How do you think that young people today could demonstrate Christian living with an aim towards making the world better today and tomorrow?

SCHOLARSHIP ESSAY SUBMITTED BY JULIANNE SANTOSPIRITO:

Coming of age is not like the movies. You are not going to have everything figured out by the end of one chapter. Growing up and experiencing all new things like learning to drive, moving out, making new friends, all of the things that make growing up-growing up. It has made me realize growth is not linear. As much as the teenager in us thinks we know everything, we don't; and it's okay to not have everything figured out. However, we learn to build communities with our peers and build deeper connections through forgiveness. Christians values of community and forgiveness shape us as individuals working on being better versions of ourselves through the eyes of others and God.

Community provides a sense of belonging and support through fostering connections between individuals that share like minded values. It is a vital network where people create meaningful relationships that allow them to grow and learn. Christianity helps to create a community of people with the same religious values and ideals. In the Christian faith, young individuals are taught to lift one another up and be there for one another. Through prayer and worship, Christians build a community based on love and acts of service.

When people come together to create a community, people build deep connections with one another from beyond their immediate families. This connection allows people to feel a sense of empathy for one another. As a Catholic, I express the value of empathy through my acts of service. The church has always pushed to "help thy neighbor." In my senior year of high school, my best friend attempted suicide. As a friend, I felt as if I had failed her. The feeling consumed me since I had always felt the overwhelming responsibility to care for anyone I hold close to me. After she was released from the hospital, the road to healing began for her. I met with her family and brought our friends together, to create a large support system, to let her know she wasn't alone. The healing process was not easy at all. When she had an off day, feeling extremely anxious or depressed, I would let her mother know and bring our friends in to get through this rough and painful moment. After that experience, it changed my values on friendship and how I would bring people together. I would try to catch my friends before they really felt like they were falling down.

Forgiveness is constantly being taught among young people, whether it's for a small childish fight or a conflict between adults. Before even starting school or daycare, children are taught the value of the words "I am sorry" through fighting with siblings or disregarding rules from parents and guardians. During mass, the homily elaborates the meaning of the gospel, that is where I find that most of them are about the idea of forgiveness. Although the act of forgiving one another may be challenging it can be transformative.

Catholicism has always been a big part of my upbringing, and it has taught me to forgive myself along with forgiving my peers and family. When I went off to college, I went to a Catholic University and it made me realize that I had steered very far away from my faith. I had always seemed to put it on the back burner because of school, sports, activities and more. When I started attending school at Manhattan College, I found myself full of guilt toward the distance that I had made between me and God. When speaking to a priest about it, He shared with me "God will forgive you for the distance, but you will need to work on it, by forgiving yourself for it. You are human and imperfect and sometimes we cannot focus on multiple things at once during adolescence." Those words allowed me to start working on repairing my relationship with my faith, through silent prayer at night and attending church every Sunday. I feel as though our relationship is now stronger than it was when I was a child.
